He Has a Plan

"For I know the plans I have for you," declares the LORD, "plans to prosper you and not to harm you, plans to give you hope and a future. Then you will call upon me and come and pray to me, and I will listen to you."

— Jeremiah 29:11

This world gets messier every day. As you see this mess getting worse, it can be hard to believe that God is in control, that God does have a plan, and that plan is still being carried out exactly according to his design.

It helps when you remember what God's plan is all about. God's plan is all about his desire to save you and bring you safely home to heaven. On that journey, he plans to prosper you . . . and not to harm you. That beautiful phrase of comfort contains a Hebrew word you are probably all familiar with — Shalom. Shalom is the common greeting of one Jewish person to another. It's a word of blessing and well-wishes. Shalom means completeness, safety, soundness, health, prosperity, tranquillity, friendship, contentment... But at its heart and core, it means peace. The LORD promises you that his plans are to give you peace and not evil, peace, not distress, peace . . . and not to harm you.

Our experience would tell us otherwise, but our experience doesn't show the whole plan. The Apostle Paul reminds us: "We know that in all things God works for the good of those who love him, who have been called according to his purpose" (Rom. 8:28). An anonymous poet described this beautiful truth in a poem



titled The Weaver. In this poem, the author describes God's plan as a tapestry. One side is beautiful, the other, a jumbled mess of thread.

Each one of our lives is a different tapestry that God is stitching and weaving together. He has a beautiful and perfect plan he is weaving through your whole life. In fact, the plan and his work of art began already in eternity before he created the world and will only be completed in your death and safe deliverance into heaven.

As you live on earth, all you see is the backside, the mess. God sees and knows the beauty of what he is creating. You will see this beauty in full when you reach your heavenly home, but even now God sews golden threads that stand out in the mess. Golden threads that are especially clear moments of recognizing God's grace and love in your life. Golden threads of mercy when you see so clearly your Savior Jesus who gave his life for you so that you would be assured of God's forgiveness. Golden threads of sheer grace where God simply heaped his love upon you as he revealed to you all the more the depths of Jesus' love for you. Golden threads as God answered prayers for strength and wisdom in difficult and trying times.

You see, your life is not about your plans. And thank God it isn't about your plans! It's all about God's plan to get you safely home to heaven. That is the hope and



future he has prepared for you!

Holding on to this beautiful truth, God says that you then "will call upon me and come and pray to me, and I will listen to you." Pray to your Lord. Pray that he will grant you the peace to trust him and his plan. Know that that prayer is heard by your God. Know that that prayer is answered by your God even if sometimes it may seem as though it isn't. But don't worry. He hears. He knows. He answers. He rescues. It's all part of God's plan.

Long Range Planning Committee Final Report

From everyone who has been given much, much will be demanded; and from the one who has been entrusted with much, much more will be asked. — Luke 12:48

There can be no doubt that our Lord and Savior has richly blessed us, both as individuals and as a congregation. Christ's love compels us to live not for ourselves, but for him, and to be faithful managers of his gifts. To that end, a Long Range Planning Committee was formed and met four times starting this past January. After careful study and discussion of demographics, trends, and interests in our community, our city, and our congregation (which included study and discussion of the congregation's responses to two congregational surveys), the committee drafted a 2023 Identity, Mission, Vision document which lays out the unique calling, opportunities, and vision for us as individuals and a congregation. In April, the committee sought congregational feedback on the document. At the same time, the committee passed along an initial draft of Long Range Ministry Goals to the church council and congregation for review, and the plan was adapted accordingly. In May and June, strategies were added to the plan with more input from the congregation and council.


On July 30th, our congregation discussed and approved a final draft of the *Identity, Mission, Vision* 2023-2028 document and the *Long Range Plan* 2023-2028 document. These documents will now help guide our congregational conversations over the next five years. Members who receive email from church have received both documents electronically. The *Long Range Plan* 2023-2028 was shared in two forms, a summary version that shows only the goals, and a more detailed version that includes strategies, due dates, and assigned personnel. Those who prefer paper copies may pick them up at the church office.



Sometimes It's Just Clear

If you live in the north central and north east states of our country, you've lived with a smoky haze for weeks. Even with wildfires thousands of miles away, the smell of burning forests can sting the nose, limit vision, and threaten fragile lungs. We long for clear skies and fresh air.

Sometimes God lets us struggle through what we think is a smoky haze when the answer doesn't seem to be clear, or even in sight. He does this to drive us to his Word, drive us to our knees in prayer, drive us to seek counsel and collaborate with fellow saints. This is always for our good, even if we cannot see the good in the moment or after we emerge from the haze. And then, sometimes it's just clear.

Mission Counselor Wayne Uhlhorn and I left Green Bay on a Tuesday morning with a heavy haze of smoke filling the air. We set off for Marquette, Michigan, to hold our next core group meeting. By the time we reached Marquette, the haze was completely gone. The sun was shining brightly and the fresh air filled our lungs. It was just...clear.

Our journey to Michigan works as a great metaphor for the new start in Marquette. Sometimes it's just clear.

From our first visit two years ago with Pastor Stephen Lehmann and every trip in between, it's just clear—we need to start a new church in Marquette! This isn't just the opinion of a mission minded pastor an hour away in Iron Mountain (Lehmann), nor that of a Midwest mission board. From visits we made with movers and shakers in the community to other WELS people we keep finding in the Marquette community, everything and everyone has kept saying...it's just clear.

That's not to say there hasn't been haze, trepidation, or uncertainty.

The fall of 2022, our board wasn't sure we were ready to submit a request for the spring Board for Home Missions meetings. We didn't have an established and active core group. If you know anything about church planting these days, that's kind of a big deal! But we knew Marquette was an excellent example of a place where we still need to do exploratory work. Obviously, it was just as clear to the Board for Home Missions as it was to us.

Along the way, there has been other haze. There are naysayers regarding the 100 missions in 10 years initiative. We also had to answer the question, "Why would you start a church in Marquette? We already have one there!" In Marquette County? Yes. In the city? No. That said, our goal isn't that one church closes so that another will thrive, but that we have two thriving congregations in Marquette County: St. Paul to focus on the rural community south of Marquette; the New Start location to focus on the area west of Marquette, near Northern Michigan University. It's just clear.

Six months after deciding to move forward with the request for a New Start in Marquette and three months after BHM approval, Wayne and I were sitting in the beautiful backyard of our gracious hosts, Ashley & Eric Nicholas (the core of the core group), talking about starting a new mission in their community. Just three days prior, Rev. Joe Lindloff had accepted the call to be the missionary of our new start! It's just clear when you see things come together like this and recognize that it's all part of God's gracious plan.

And still, there's more! At this meeting we met two new members of the core group. Evan, a traveling nurse, is looking for a position closer to home, not only so he can be home every night with his wife and child (and #2 on the way), but also so he can help establish a new mission with a man who was a senior he looked up to at Michigan Lutheran Seminary. Next, we met Sydney, who went to NMU to get her graduate degree in counseling. She works at Christian Family Solutions(CFS) and decided to stay in Marquette after completing her degree. Early in our research for the new start, we saw a huge benefit to having a CFS counselor at the new start. Now, three months after approval, God introduced us to Sydney who is excited by the prospect of setting up shop together with our new mission!

I think by now you're seeing it too. It's just clear. God is working in wondrous ways to gather more sheep in the Marquette community. I can't wait to see what else God has planned for his church in Marquette!
