No Other Gospel

Paul wrote to the Galatian Christians:

"I am astonished that you are so quickly deserting the one who called you by the grace of Christ, and our turning to a different gospel - which is really no gospel at all"

— Galatians 1:6, 7

The Apostle Paul had seen a lot of things in his lifetime, but it floored him to hear that the Galatian Christians of his day were letting the gospel slip through their fingers. They had just come to faith. They knew and believed the gospel, the good news that Jesus, the Savior had taken all their sins away. But now they were giving air time in their congregations to a group of false teachers who came to throw them into confusion.

Paul doesn't give the false teachers the honor of naming them. He says, "Some people are throwing you into confusion." But we know those people to be a group called Judaizers. Judaizers believed Jesus was the promised Messiah. They just didn't believe that faith in him was enough to save anyone. They thought that people also had to do certain things, too. Specifically, people needed to keep doing the Old Testament Laws that were no longer in effect -things like circumcision and avoiding certain kinds of food. It sounded good to people who still loved those old laws. To them, it seemed like this was a new and improved kind of gospel. They could have Jesus and take credit for obeying

the old laws.

Paul made it clear this was not new and improved. He said that what they were hearing was (v. 7) "no gospel at all." Once you add anything to God's GIFT of forgiveness and eternal life, even just a little bit of something, then it's not a gift anymore. It's not grace. And it's not the gospel.

Do we ever try to add something to the gospel? Well, not on paper. By God's grace we teach it right. We teach that Jesus did it all. We teach that there's nothing left for us to do. We teach that we are saved by faith alone, and that even our faith is a gift from God through his Word and Sacraments. But in our sinful nature, we keep getting it wrong. When we make a good change in our lives, it's easy to feel like we've earned something in heaven's record books. Look at me, Lord, I started my devotion schedule back up again! Or... I'm helping a needy person! Or... I'm being generous, or selfless, or chaste, or pure! Our sinful pride desperately wants recognition and reward, even if that means we have to set the gospel temporarily aside to get it. We want to believe we've earned it.

Through his apostle Paul, the Lord has something to say to anyone who wants to add anything to the gospel good news of Jesus. He says, "Let them be eternally condemned!" We do well to say it, too, to the sinful nature that still clings to



us. All the more clearly, then, can we listen to the pure gospel, the Spirit-filled message that comes with no strings attached. The news God has for us is so good, it can't be improved upon! Listen, fellow sinner. Jesus has taken all your sins away -- period.

Father, help me to remember that I am yours, and help me to follow your will. Amen.

Get to Know Pastor Ben Enstad

Pastor Benjamin Enstad was born and raised by Mr. and Mrs. Jon Enstad in Minnesota on the north side of the Twin Cities. Pastor Enstad is the oldest of six. Pastor's home congregation is Cross of Christ Lutheran Church in Coon Rapids, MN. It was here that he attended the church's Lutheran Elementary School. He attended Luther Preparatory School, graduating in 2001. He was classmates and friends with his future wife, Amber Ireland, who was a "townie" and lived just outside of Watertown in Lebanon, WI. LPS opened Pastor Enstad's eyes to the possibility of being a pastor.

Pastor Enstad graduated from Martin Luther College in 2005. It was during their time at MLC that Pastor and Amber began dating, and were engaged near the end of their senior year. Built on the Rock Update:

On Sunday, June 12th, the voters of St. Paul approved the recommendation of the Built on the Rock Steering Committee and the Church Council to move forward with our whole project in phases.

Phase One will see the construction of the office and classroom wing with the basement portion under that wing; construction will begin as soon as possible. Phase Two will be the construction of the narthex/gathering space and the lower level of that space and will be completed as soon as we can, following the completion of Phase One.

The path we've set for ourselves won't be easy. It will require sacrifice. But the sacrifice is one we as a congregation have chosen to make, knowing how much we are loved by God our Savior, and also how much this project will mean for many souls for many years to come. Under his blessing, together, we can do it.




Cameroon Seminary Graduates Seven

May 27, 2022, was an amazing day for our brothers and sisters in Cameroon. Amidst celebrations that reached across Africa, the Lutheran Church of Cameroon graduated seven men into the full-time work of the holy ministry.

In 2016 the LCC identified 14 men to begin ministerial training. They were men with a reasonable level of education, a Spirit-led love for the Lord, and some years of service as laymen in their congregations.

There were, of course, losses along the way. A few stu-
