#### No Condemnation


God demands a lot. In fact, he demands perfection. Be holy because I, the Lord your God, am holy (Leviticus 19:2). His condemnation of those who don't measure up is severe. The one who sins is the one who will die (Ezekiel 18:20). And that is the complete death of which God warned Adam in the Garden of Eden—physical death, spiritual death, and eternal death in hell.

Therefore, any chance of rescue MUST come from outside of us. In fact, we can't be involved at all! And that is what the Apostle Paul emphasizes at the beginning of Romans chapter 8:

Therefore, there is now no condemnation for those who are in Christ Jesus, because through Christ Jesus the law of the Spirit who gives life has set you free from the law of sin and death. For what the law was powerless to do because it was weakened by the flesh, God did by sending his own Son in the likeness of sinful flesh to be a sin offering. And so he condemned sin in the flesh, in order that the righteous requirement of the law might be fully met in us, who do not live according to the flesh but according to the Spirit.

— Romans 8:1-4

It's really hard for us to imagine something so important in our lives that we have no control over. Maybe you struggle with flying because you can't handle not being in control. Then again, you do make a choice to fly. Maybe your upcoming surgery terrifies you because you will be put under and everything will be out of your control. Then again, you still elect to have surgery even if you and your doctors deem it necessary.



Why? Because [God sent] his own Son in the likeness of sinful flesh to be a sin offering. And so he condemned sin in the flesh, in order that the righteous requirement of the law might be fully met in us...

Not only did Jesus keep every one of God's commands perfectly for us, he also fulfilled what God's righteous requirement demands—he was condemned for us. This could only happen because he took on our human flesh. Because Jesus has done this for us, God works a great




exchange. Jesus' perfect life and the payment for sin are all given to us. This is why and is the only way that there can be no condemnation for those who are in Christ Jesus.

### October Worship: WELS 175th Anniversary

Our synod's 175th anniversary is celebrated on three Sundays in the month of October. The anniversary theme is "Christ Through Us," which matches the theme of the service plans from the 2025 WELS Convention and also titles the work of WELS in a ten-year detailed plan to proclaim our Savior's love. You'll hear Christ Through Us often over the next ten years.

The 175th anniversary celebration begins in our worship on Sunday, October 12, with the focus on "Christ FOR Us". Our faith is founded on the fact that Jesus Christ's life, death, and resurrection were not for his own benefit but specifically for humanity's salvation. Our synod was founded on this belief.


On October 19, we consider "Christ THROUGH Us" and easily see how Christ has worked through his good news of salvation in Word and sacraments to move this body of believers to establish a Scripture -based ministerial education system, world missions in 45 countries, and more than 1,200 congregations across the United States.

We conclude our celebration on October 26 by looking ahead, and the reminder is "Christ WITH Us". We take comfort in knowing that Jesus himself is always with us and is especially with us in Word and sacrament. We look to the future with the promise of his presence.





### More 175th Anniversary Resources

In addition to worship, many other resources are available to celebrate the 175th anniversary of the Wisconsin Evangelical Lutheran Synod and to learn about its history.

- In the June newsletter, we encouraged you to take time during this 175th anniversary year to reflect on how God has led his people in truth through this church body to which we belong by reading the book *Christ Through Us: A Pictorial History of the Wisconsin Synod (1850-2025)*. This well-crafted book commemorates the anniversary by relating the blessed historical journey that began in 1850 with a few humble Milwaukee congregations of German immigrants working together on Gospel ministry and continues to a world-wide group of Christians proclaiming the message of Christ around the world in 2025. Whether you read every word, enjoy small sections, or even just look at the photos, you'll appreciate the times, people, and places that are part of our synod's history. Several copies are available to borrow from our church library.

#### Find Rest in God Alone

Our FVL Schools theme for this year, "Find Rest in God Alone" (Psalm 62:1–2), reminds us that true peace and security are found only in our Savior. In October, we focus on resting in the power of God's Word. God's Word shows us his love, points us to Christ's redeeming work, and gives us strength for each day. I pray that you and your family find time this month to be refreshed and renewed by the power of God's Word.



This fall, students at St. Paul have enjoyed a variety of field trips that allowed them to experience God's creation firsthand. Our 3K and 4K students visited Sabamba Alpaca Ranch, learning about animals and their care in a hands-on environment. Kindergarten students explored Barkhausen Waterfowl Preserve, discovering the wonders of wetlands and local wildlife. Our 3rd and 4th graders visited Bay Beach Wildlife Sanctuary, observing native animals up close, while 4th graders also had the chance to attend a field day at Fox Valley Lutheran High School. Finally, our 5th and 6th graders returned to Barkhausen Waterfowl Preserve, studying waterfowl and geological formations. These experiences gave our students the opportunity to marvel at God's handiwork and see His power in creation.

#### **Celebrating Growth and Blessings**

This year, St. Paul Lutheran School is blessed to welcome 175 students from 103 families into our Christ-centered classrooms, including 146 students in K–8. Of these families, 53 are members of St. Paul, while the rest represent a mix of other WELS congregations, other Christian denominations, and unchurched households—reminding us of the tremendous outreach opportunities before us.

This year features a **historic enrollment milestone**: the last time our K–8 enrollment reached 146 students was back in 1982. Today, God has brought us back to that level of growth, showing His abundant blessings and the commitment of our congregation to Christian education.



Our growth has also created an increased need for staff and volunteers to support all of our new families and maintain a Christ-centered learning environment. If you are interested in sharing your time, talents, or gifts with our students and school community, we would love to have you join us. Opportunities are available in classrooms, lunch supervision, field trips, and other areas. Please contact the school office to learn how you can get involved!

## Seven New Home Missions Approved from the WELS Missions Blog

For generations, WELS congregations have been beacons of Christ's light, proclaiming the gospel and nurturing faith.

Yet millions in North America still live beyond the reach of a

WELS church. Through the 100 Missions in 10 Years initiative, WELS Home Missions is planting new churches where hope is needed most, while strengthening our synod and building a growing network of gospel outposts.



This vision is coming to life thanks to your prayers and support. At the fall Board for Home Missions meeting, seven new missions were approved—each one a new beacon of Christ's light, made possible by your generosity.

The seven new mission starts include:

- <u>Altoona, Wisconsin</u>: Just east of Eau Claire, Altoona is rapidly growing. A core group from St. Mark in Eau Claire has been doing outreach since early 2023, steadily building interest.
- <u>Buffalo</u>, <u>New York</u>: With 95,000 people in the target area and no WELS church nearby, a committed group is meeting to lay the foundation for a new church.
- Naples, Florida: Naples is growing quickly and changing demographically. Leaders are meeting with locals and planning outreach to connect with unchurched residents.
- Olathe, Kansas: A booming, family-friendly city in the Kansas City metro, Olathe is home to a core group from Mt. Olive in Overland Park that's planning for future growth.
- <u>The Sandhills, North Carolina.</u>: This growing region near Fort Bragg attracts retirees and military families. A
  group from Tree of Life in Cary is actively canvassing and building a prospect list.
- <u>West Richland, Washington</u>: Near the Tri-Cities, West Richland is expanding quickly. A group from Southridge in Kennewick began outreach and plans to launch worship in 2025.
- Wilmington, North Carolina: In a fast-growing area with no nearby WELS church, a group from Ascension in Jack-sonville meets regularly in preparation to launch their church.

This isn't a short burst of effort—it's the steady building of a lighthouse. Each new congregation is another beacon of Christ's light in a darkening world. With your help, we're building a network of gospel outposts—one light, one soul at a time.
